Preparing your talk:

- 8 mins presentation + 2 mins questions. Note that there is NO poster component of this presentation.
- You will be presenting to a multidisciplinary audience so please pitch your presentation accordingly.
- PowerPoint slides should be in widescreen 16:9 format. This is essential for optimal viewing.
- Include as your first slide a title slide that clearly states: your name, your organisational affiliations and your presentation title.
- Use a symbol on your presentation to indicate whether or not your talk may be included in social media posts. We recommend also annotating data slides to indicate if the work presented is unpublished.
- Ensure text and figures are clearly legible.
- Ensure your presentation file is no more than 1 GB in size. If using custom fonts or design styles, consider using advanced save options to preserve formatting fidelity.
 Name the file in the following format: ORAL_FAMILY-NAME_FIRST-NAME.ppt

- Your presentation will be made at the Monash Institute of Pharmaceutical Sciences (MIPS). A live stream of

- During the session, you will share your presentation slides and deliver your talk from the PC (Windows computer) at MIPS, onto which your PPT file will have been pre-loaded and linked to our master slides.
 Please note that we require that you share your PowerPoint presentation with us by 5pm on Wednesday 30th
 October via the form above, so we can link your talk to our master slides in a timely way.
- Verbally remind delegates of your wishes about whether your presentation may be included in social media posts when you give your talk.
- A timer will be used to ensure that all speakers get their 10 minute time frame. Visual notification will be given by the session chair at 1 minute remaining before the 8 minutes is up. Anyone not finished within the time allotted will be kindly asked to stop their presentation.
- After your 8 minute presentation, you may be asked questions from the audience for up to 2 minutes.
- Judges will be assessing your presentation on a number of criteria for the awarding of prizes.

Preparing your talk:

- We will have approximately 9 participants in each Science Bites session. It is of utmost importance that each person presents their talk strictly within the 3 min timeframe: please prepare your slides accordingly, as below.
- 3 minutes maximum for the presentation with 1 MINUTE FOR QUESTIONS. Note that there is NO poster component of this presentation.
- You will be presenting to a multidisciplinary audience so please pitch your presentation accordingly.
- PowerPoint slides should be in widescreen 16:9 format. This is essential for optimal viewing.
- Include as your first slide a title slide that clearly states: your name, your organisational affiliations and your presentation title.
- Use a symbol on your presentation to indicate whether or not your talk may be included in social media posts. We recommend also annotating data slides to indicate if the work presented is unpublished.
- Ensure text and figures are clearly legible.
- Up to 3 data slides only. The title slide, described above, is extra, for a total of 4 slides.
- <u>Absolutely no animations</u>. No acknowledgement slide is to be presented.
- Ensure your presentation file is no more than 1 GB in size. If using custom fonts or design styles, consider using advanced save options to preserve formatting fidelity.

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Preparing your poster

- Prepare your poster in <u>PORTRAIT orientation</u>. Maximum poster size is <u>A0 (84.1 cm x 118.9 cm)</u>.
 Poster display space is limited if your poster does not adhere to these size restrictions there may not be room to display it. Note that there will be no virtual posters at this year's Symposium.
- We request that you prepare a spiel of no more than a minute with which to present your poster to the judges
 during your session, as they will each have a number of posters to assess and only limited time to do so.
 You will be presenting to a multidisciplinary audience so please pitch your presentation and poster accordingly.
- Include your name, any co-authors, your organisational affiliations and your poster title.

- Ensure text and figures are clearly legible. As a guide, your smallest font should remain easily readable when viewed from approximately 1 metre away.
- Consider using a symbol to indicate whether or not your poster may be included in social media posts.

On the day – Friday 8 November 2024:

• We will have approximately 38 participants in each poster session (one during lunchtime and one in the evening, as noted above).

Please check the program carefully as to which session you are scheduled to present in.

- Lunchtime poster session presenters should:
 - Hang their posters on arrival
 - Remove their posters promptly at the conclusion of lunch
- Evening poster session presenters should:
 - Hang their posters at the afternoon tea break
 - Remove their posters promptly at the conclusion of the evening poster session
- Velcro dots will be supplied by VIIN to allow you to adhere your poster to the poster board.
- Storage for posters will be available. The specific location for storage will be provided closer to the date of the symposium.
- Poster prize judges will be visiting posters and expecting to speak to presenters during their poster session.
- Please be present at your poster for at least the first 45 minutes of each poster session, both for delegates
 wishing to speak to you about your work, and to remain available for judging. Consider asking a friend to bring
 you catering at your poster.
- Verbally remind delegates of your wishes about whether your poster may be included in social media posts when you deliver your spiel in front of your poster.
